Fly Control is a Must

To people, time flies when you're having fun. To frogs, time's fun when you're having flies. To cattle producers, however, "fun" and "flies" are never used in the same sentence. These pests cost the livestock industry hundreds of millions of dollars every year.

Consider horn flies — each one will take 20 to 30 blood meals each day and may travel a couple of miles to do it. They have been implicated in the spread of blood-borne diseases. Adults live almost two months. The 300 to 500 eggs the female horn fly lays can mature to adults in two weeks. Face flies reproduce even quicker (8 to 10 days) and in equal numbers. Face flies aren't "out for blood," but instead feed on the moisture around their hosts' eyes, nostrils and mouths. Face flies are one of the main means of spreading pinkeye. Then there are stable flies, horse flies and heel flies (the larval stage is the cattle grub).

The biggest cost of fly infestations is not disease or blood loss; it is the constant irritation and aggravation they cause cattle. Cattle will expend tremendous energy stomping and swishing, they'll head for the shade to lie down, stand belly deep in the pond or bunch up in groups to try to get some relief from the constant onslaught of flies. Horn flies, for instance, stay on cattle 24 hours a day. It follows that performance is going to suffer, and it doesn't take large numbers of flies to get into your pocket book. Most research has shown that the economic threshold is 100 to 200 flies per side, or 200 to 400 per animal.

That's not many flies for a significant loss in production. Threshold levels can reduce summer stocker gains by as much as 50 to 70 pounds over the season. Lower milk production in the cow and growth in the calf can reduce weaning weights by 20 pounds or more in the fall. So, fly control is a critical aspect of late spring, summer and early fall management and offers a cost: benefit ratio equal to implanting or internal parasite control.

There are many choices of control methods and products: sprays, pour-ons, dusters, rubs, ear tags, mineral and feed additives, dips, traps and boluses. The right one or combination depends on your own situation. Regardless of which you use, though, the fly population must be susceptible to the product. Regular monitoring and adjustments are needed to ensure adequate control during the season. It is a fact that fly populations can build resistance to any of the chemicals in these products, both the pyrethroids and their synthetics and the organophosphates. A standard recommendation is to rotate the class of product used each year to minimize this problem. Here are a few considerations associated with some of the methods.

Sprays

Quick knockdown with some residual for 2 to 6 weeks depending on rainfall; several applications may be necessary; works well in combination with other methods.

Pour-ons. Good knockdown as initial treatment; some only

get blood feeders (systemic) so face flies aren't affected; others are topical (contact); generally limited to a month or so of control, so must be repeated or used with another method.

Tags. Can be effective as a stand-alone control for up to 5 months; don't apply until flies are present in near threshold numbers in late spring or early summer; use recommended number, usually two per animal; remove after 5 months of use (earlier if effectiveness declines); consider knockdown with spray or pour-on when tags are applied.

Rubs. Can be effective as stand-alone control, especially if forced-use is possible; should be re-charged regularly, after each rain event or every 2 to 4 weeks.

Dusters. Can be effective if maintained regularly and forced-use is possible; usually must be protected from weather to prevent caking.

"Feed-through" larvicides. Available in mineral, block or feed additive; individual intake can vary with any self-fed product; does not control migrating adults from neighboring ranches or herds, so probably should be used with another method.

Most of the fly-control products have no withdrawal time, but some do. Most will also recommend a minimum treatment interval. As always, read and follow label directions.

Fly control is critical to the health and performance of cattle. While some methods and products may seem expensive and/or labor intensive, it is a practice that will more than pay for itself during the season.

Spring Council Meeting

The Spring Council meeting was called to order at 9:15 a.m. April 25, 2014, in Fryeburg, Maine by President Michelle Ogle (NJ). Present: Past-President and Treasurer Jon Bednarski (KY), Leanne Fogle (IL), Scott Griffith (TX), and Secretary Lisa Lovett (IL). Also present was Executive Director Victor Eggleston (WI). Leanne Fogle represented the newsletter office. Absent: Jane Hemmer (GA), Vice-President Greg Hipple (IA), Brice Jackson (IN) and Chuck Neely (VA).

Secretary's Report. Lisa Lovett reported membership totals during 2013 were 705 Regular, 138 Junior, 15 Associate and 119 Life for a total membership of 977. The 2013 registration/ transfer data included 271 Males, 849 Purebred Females, 111 Appendix Females and 1023 Transfers. Total transactions were 2,254. Current membership through March 31, 2014: 566 Regular, 85 Junior, 11 Associate, 121 Life, for a total of 783 memberships. Transactions for the first three months of 2014 include: 71 Male, 325 Purebred Female, 44 Appendix, and 235 Transfers for a total of 675 transactions.

Treasurer's Report. Jon Bednarski accepted the role of Treasurer of the Belted Galloway Society, Inc. in January 2014. He reported the Society has \$19,823.71 in checking, \$25,817.49 in savings, and \$101,186.72 in a certificate of deposit. Society assets total \$146,829.72.

Annual General Meeting. Chairman Jon Bednarski announced the 2014 Annual General Meeting will return to Louisville, KY. The meeting will be held in conjunction with the National Belted Galloway Show and Premium Sale during the North American International Livestock Exposition. The Hilton Garden Inn will be hotel headquarters and the location of the annual meeting. The committee is considering adding an educational program to the event.

Budget and Finance. Executive Director Vic Eggleston reported the Society budget was approved during March 2014. Eggleston reviewed the approved budget with Council.

Belted Galloway Junior Association. President Ogle announced that Scot Adams (ME) has been appointed as chairman in 2014. Adams was present during the meeting and is excited to assume the role. Adams has plans to meet with regional leaders. His objectives include educational programs, breed promotion and developing youth leadership roles.

Chatfield Scholarship. President Ogle announced that Jane Jackson (IN) is the chairman of the committee. Jackson has established a timeline for the 2014 selection process. Scholarship applications are due April 30, 2014 and the committee will make their final decisions by May 20, 2014. The winners will be announced in the newsletter and profiled in *The Belted Galloway Journal*.

Information and Technology Committee. Chairman Scott Griffith asked Council for their input regarding the new website that has been launched. New photos will be added and Council submitted information to be updated. The site will no longer include a Meet the Breeder's page and the Breeder's Directory. A link to the CLRC website will replace those pages so that all breeders will be linked to www.beltie.org. The committee will generate an online survey.

Long Range Planning Committee. President Ogle named Andy LeMaistre (ME) as chairman the committee. Vic Eggleston has communicated with Andy LeMaistre to establish long and shortterm goals. Council has made a request of the committee to investigate adding the purebred mismarked cattle to the Herdbook proper.

Promotion and Advertising Committee. Chairman Bednarski reported that Connections will begin ad sales in 30 days for production of *The Belted Galloway Journal*. Media kits have been developed to attract outside advertisers. The calendar contest will continue and the theme is "Cows and their Calves" with a photo submission deadline of July 1, 2014. Calendars will be available in August 2014. The calendar will continue to include breeding dates. Chuck Neely (VA) worked with Bednarski to develop a Belted Galloway specific nutritional card that may be inserted in the breed brochures. Members may make their requests for the inserts to the executive director's office.

Newsletter Committee. Chairman Leanne Fogle presented cost comparisons to print the newsletter in black and white versus color. Council approved the recommendation to print the newsletter in color.

Sale Committee. Chairman Michelle Ogle reported that the 2014 Belted Galloway Premium Sale will return to Louisville, KY. A change of venue has been planned. Sale cattle will be present, but cattle will be sold via video immediately following the Annual General Meeting and Banquet at the Hilton Garden Inn. Buyers will be encouraged to allow the cattle to be shown the following day in the National Show but it will not be a requirement.

Show Committee. Chairman Michelle Ogle made several recommendations to Council. Council approved that show entries for Purebred Appendix cattle and percentage Appendix cattle must total at least five of each or more, to hold separate classes and championships in both the Open and the Junior Show at Louisville, KY. Council approved the age of the calf at the side of a cow being shown should not be over 270 days. Council took no action regarding the current rule allowing cattle to be shown by a Junior member at a Junior show that are co-owned with an adult member. Council approved adding a Bred and Owned class(s), and awarding a Bred and Owned Champion/Reserve at Louisville, KY during the Junior show. Council approved offering a separate division and Champion/Reserve for Cow/Calf pairs during the Junior show at Louisville, KY. Council took no action to augment or change the current Lifetime Point system and classifications.

New Business.

2015 Spring Council Meeting. Council is considering holding the 2015 Spring Council Meeting in Texas.

Preamble/Mission Statement. Council moved to change the Society's mission statement previously adopted in in 2009. Council approved establishing the original preamble of the Soci-

ety as the official mission statement: The mission of the Belted Galloway Society Inc. is to promote the Belted Galloway breed of cattle, to preserve the purity of the breed by maintaining pedigree records and data, to disseminate information relative to said breed of cattle and to carry on all legal and proper activities to effectuate the primary purpose of the corporation.

World Conference. Jon Bednarski will submit a proposal to hold the World Galloway Conference in the US during 2018 or 2020.

Old Business. Council held round-table discussions of concept programs to further the Belted Galloway breed.

Other business. Executive Director Eggleston announced that the Belted Galloway Society, Inc. is the second largest beef breed association that CLRC represents. Jon Bednarski will continue to do farm visits through 2014.






