A Former Show Steer Named "Dunny"

Editor's Note: A special bond is formed between show steers and their owners. Here is a fun story about a show steer owned by the Terry Willis family from Belvidere, Illinois and how Marlow and Jon Peters from Dresden, Tennessee gave Dunny a forever home.

Sometimes you are blessed with a person, event, or animal, that defines your childhood or impacts you in a way you will never forget. Dunny, our sons' show steer, would be one of those animals. The day we walked Dunny (or officially Uphill Gunner 9397-D) off of the trailer we knew we had a special steer. We just didn't realize it. Not only did he turn out to be a great show steer, but a real character as well. Dunny won almost every Beltie show he attended, turned the heads of many judges, and beat his share of other breed steers along the way.

In those days, many Belted Galloway youth attended Beltie Camp at the University of Tennessee-Martin and our sons, Chris and Steve, took him to Beltie Camp. The beauty of Beltie Camp was that all youth could take their animal with them for a week of education and show skills. Upon their return from camp and to our complete surprise, Dunny was so tame that Steve jumped on him and rode him to the barn. That day, Julie decided to outfit Dunny with a blanket, saddle, bridle, and a bit. Julie placed the

bit in his mouth and said, "I don't think he will like this." To our amazement he was perfectly fine and he was now equipped to ride.

We have no idea how many kids and adults that Dunny entertained at shows and fairs that year. He was a hit at local petting farms as well. Dunny would hang his head over the gate into the aisle as kids, adults, elderly, and handicapped folks passed through the barn. Their eyes would light up when they petted his big furry head. Dunny also participated in a Halloween contest at a local store. He was truly a Beltie ambassador for our breed that year!

As the year wore on, we were worried and upset when we thought about the "end of the trail" for Dunny. But fate stepped in and we were contacted by Marlow and John Peters

of Dresden, Tennessee. They saw Dunny at Beltie Camp and explained that their plan was to own one animal of all three Belted Galloway colors. They thought he was special and wanted to save him from the normal end of a steer's life – the dinner table. They assured us that he would have a long and happy home with them. Thus, Dunny began the next part of his amazing life.

The first memorable story I can recall of Dunny is when he was being shown for the last time at North American International Livestock Exposition in Louisville, Kentucky. After the competition was over, and Dunny had been declared Grand Champion

Steer, someone put a saddle on him. One of the Willis boys got on him and he was riding him around like a horse. Standing behind me were two tall, lean, mustached fellows. They were the very imagine of what a cowboys look like as they chewed to-bacco with their thumbs in their belts. After watching Dunny, one of them turned to the other and said, "Now ain't that the darndest thing you ever saw?"

It was indeed! I'm pretty sure there has not been anything like Dunny in the whole history of the cattle world. The only thing that comes to mind is a cross between two fictional animals, Babe the Blue Ox and Ferdinand the Bull.





Dunny is a lovable, very large bun-

dle of curly hair. He will let three kids sit on his back all at the same time or recline against him in the pasture as if he were a sofa. He will lick the gloves off of your hands or the bottom out of a bucket looking for treats or that last bit of feed. Dunny will nudge you like a cat looking to be stroked or just stand there and give you a look that melts your heart. Those cowboys were way more right than they knew. Dunny is the darndest thing anyone has ever seen!

Added note: Dunny just celebrated his 13th birthday with the Peters. He enjoyed allot of brushing and cow cookies.

DNA Fees

As of July 1, 2016, the fee for establishing DNA parentage will be reduced to \$45. This a \$5 reduction from the previous fee. DNA testing may be done using a sample of blood, hair or semen from your animal. Hypotrichosis testing may also be done at the same time for an additional fee of \$20. Please contact Vic Eggleston to generate the paperwork required for testing. The member requesting the test will mail the sample to UC Davis and the results will be forwarded to the member by Eggleston.

Deceased Animals

Please return registration papers to the CLRC when an animal within your herd is deceased. It ensures that the Society database has the most up-to-date information.

- ♦ About bulls ... Before advertising a young male be sure he is well conformed, tracks properly, has good legs and feet, and exhibits good weight gains. We should have data available on his birth weight, 205-day weaning weight, and yearling weight. If he's reached breeding age (around 18 months), it's definitely a plus to have his semen checked for quantity and motility, and uniform scrotal development (two normal sized testicles). Any data available should appear in your advertisement along with his birth date and the names of his sire and dam. It is required that registration numbers be included on bulls advertised for sale in the classifieds.


